1	<b>Champney Cottage, Cranmore Lane</b>	C17, central chimney bricked up to first floor, above lathe and plaster.
2	<b>Charles Cottage, Silkmore Lane</b>	C16, inglenook hearth bread oven and chimney
3	<b>Fullers Farm, Fullers Farm Road</b>	C16, two-bays remain of a four-bay medieval open-hall house with a two-bay open-hall in the centre, roof timbers well smoked
4	<b>Grovelands, The Street</b>	C17, external brick facing to older building, internal jetty with free standing hearth to hall.
5	<b>Hillside Manor, Woodcote</b>	C16, remains for original timber framed house in centre of much extended dwelling
6	<b>Hookwood Farm, Woodcote</b>	C14, timber framing and large early brick hearth, wattle & daub internal walls
7	<b>Hornbeams, 174 The Street</b>	C16, two-bay medieval timber frame house remains at the rear with bread oven
8	<b>King William IV, The Street</b>	C18, "coffin windows", lean-to extension to make beer after the 1830 Alehouses Act
9	<b>Little Wings, Cranmore Lane</b>	C16, three-bay timber framed house with later facing brick and roof
10	<b>Nightingales, Tintells Lane</b>	C16, original house extended to front to form a "double-pile" house
11	<b>Part Wings 1 &amp; 2, Cranmore Lane</b>	C16, original house extended to front to form a 'double-pile' house
12	<b>Pebble Hill, Shere Road</b>	C16, much altered by the Horsley brick-making family of Mabanke
13	<b>The Barley Mow PH</b>	C 15, originally a two-bay timber fronted cottage with smoke blackened whole tree trunks as roof timbers, extended and inglenook fireplace added to become a P.H.
14	<b>The Laurels, 170 The Street</b>	C18, early typical balanced cottage, middle door windows each side
15	<b>The Old Cottage, Cranmore Lane</b>	C14, brick hearth jutting out at rear
16	<b>The Old Soap House, Ripley Lane</b>	C15, soap making evidence from chemicals encrusted in walls
17	<b>Waterloo Farm Cottage, East Lane</b>	C15, original house at rear of 18 <sup>th</sup> century house
18	<b>Woodcote Lodge, Woodcote</b>	C17, original house much altered by Lord Lovelace mid-1800's

**1. Champney Cottage, Cranmore Lane**

C17, central chimney bricked up to first floor, above lathe and plaster.



**2. Charles Cottage, Silkmore Lane**

C16, inglenook hearth bread oven and chimney



**3. Fullers Farm, Fullers Farm Road**

C16, two-bays remain of a four-bay medieval open-hall house with a two-bay open-hall in the centre, roof timbers well smoked



**4. Grovelands, The Street**

C17, external brick facing to older building, internal jetty with free standing hearth to hall.



**5. Hillside Manor, Woodcote**

C16, remains for original timber framed house in centre of much extended dwelling



**6. Hookwood Farm, Woodcote**

C14, timber framing and large early brick hearth, wattle & daub internal walls



**7. Hornbeams, 174 The Street**

C16, two-bay medieval timber frame house remains at the rear with bread oven



**8. King William IV, The Street**

C18, "coffin windows", lean-to extension to make beer after the 1830 Alehouses Act



**9. Little Wings, Cranmore Lane**

C16, three-bay timber framed house with later facing brick and roof



**10. Nightingales. Tintells Lane**

C16, original house extended to front to form a "double-pile" house



**11. Part Wings 1 & 2, Cranmore Lane**

C16, original house extended to front to form a 'double-pile' house



**12. Pebble Hill, Shere Road**

C16, much altered by the Horsley brick-making family of Mabanke



### 13. The Barley Mow PH

C 15, originally a two-bay timber fronted cottage with smoke blackened whole tree trunks as roof timbers, extended and inglenook fireplace added to become a P.H.



### 14. The Laurels, 170 The Street

C18, early typical balanced cottage, middle door windows each side



### 15. The Old Cottage, Cranmore Lane

C14, brick hearth jutting out at rear



### 16. The Old Soap House, Ripley Lane

C15, soap making evidence from chemicals encrusted in walls



**17. Waterloo Farm Cottage, East Lane**

C15, original house at rear of 18<sup>th</sup> century house



**18. Woodcote Lodge, Woodcote**

C17, original house much altered by Lord Lovelace mid-1800's
